It's May and we are busy! Advanced Placement Testing was May 2-13. 241 exams were administered either at the City Park building or the school. Thank you City of Brunswick for sharing your space with us! PARCC exams began May 13 and will continue through a make-up exam window that runs until June 10. Our Biology and Government High School Assessments will be given June 2-3.

Our seniors are counting their days and are excited, and anxious, about graduating. Their last day is May 24, and they have the schedule for practices, etc. Please encourage them to leave home on time and drive carefully. If they are a few minutes late, they stay a few minutes later. Our graduation is 10 a.m. Allow extra time to get there. Sometimes traffic on U. S. 15 can be heavy.

Underclassmen will be bringing a note home regarding graduation day, June 1. We have many staff members involved in graduation so our staff at the school will be limited that day. Please let us know what your intention is for your child.

**DISCLAIMER:** FCPS provides scholarship information as a resource only and does not endorse any sponsor of any particular scholarship program. *Compulsory School Attendance Age Increasing: Senate Bill 362, Age for Compulsory Public School Attendance, was passed by the 2012 Maryland General Assembly and signed into law by the Governor. The law increases the age of compulsory school attendance from 16 to 18 and must be fully implemented by school systems by the beginning of the 2017-2018 school year. Phase one of the law becomes effective on July 1, 2015, and increases the age of compulsory school attendance from 16 to 17. Phase two must be fully implemented by the beginning of the 2018-19 school year and further increases the age of compulsory school attendance from 17 to 18.*

**FCC – Student Ambassadors:** The Admissions Office at Frederick Community College is looking for student ambassadors for the fall semester. Each year 20-25 Frederick County high school seniors are awarded the Ambassador Scholarship for maintaining a 3.5 GPA through high school. **FCPS Students:** New law will benefit students and lower their share of college tuition. The law requires public school systems to work jointly with public institutions of higher education including local community colleges on dual-enrollment programs that offer reduced tuition. FCPS is working with Frederick Community College to that end. FCPS urges all students who are dually enrolled or who want to pursue dual enrollment in the future to visit their high school's counseling office for a College and Career Readiness Public Institution of Higher Education (PIHE) Dual Enrollment Application Form that reflects changes in the law. Therefore, students should apply for admission and check with the financial aid office, as well as the department of your subject matter for financial aid opportunities. All students and their parents can fill out a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) any time after January 1 of their senior year and submit the application online at [www.fafsa.ed.gov](http://www.fafsa.ed.gov). Also, check with each college and fill out any college financial aid applications that are required

**Net Price Calculator:** The Net Price Calculator (NPC) is an online tool that provides estimates of college costs for prospective students, based on a set of inputs such as family income, size, and assets. THE NPC calculates estimated grant and scholarship aid and subtracts that total from the college's cost of attendance, resulting in an estimated net price. NPC then goes the next step and subtracts the student's estimated loans/financial aid to determine the estimated remaining cost. The idea behind the website is that students typically find themselves in careers not related to their major and/or change careers up to 10 times in their lifetime, so having a solid education is critical to success. What Will They Learn believes that having students be required to take courses in the seven core subjects better prepares them to compete in the global market place, be effective leaders, and be life-long learners. Scores for each school reflects how many of each of the 4 seven core courses are required at that institution. This is an excellent resource but keep in mind that it is evaluating ONLY whether or not the school requires courses in the seven core subjects, and not the school as a whole. Use this site as a supplemental tool when evaluating colleges and universities, not as a scoring tool to determine the overall effectiveness of the school.

**Work Permits:** There are new directions for minors (ages 14-17) wishing to get a work permit. 1) Complete the on-line application: <https://www.dllr.state.md.us/childworkpermit/>. 2) Print the work permit. 3) Get the work permit signed by the minor (student), parent or legal guardian and employer (work permits are only valid when signed by all parties) During the 2014 session, the Maryland General Assembly passed House Bill 467 that modified the requirements that must be met before a minor work permit can be issued. The change requires the minor's parent or guardian to certify that the age on the minor work permit is correct rather than producing proof of age to an issuing officer. This change allows the Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation to grant applicants the ability to download and print a work permit directly from the application website. The new system began July 29. Minors are no longer required to obtain their work permit from an issuing officer.

## Math Department News

The last SAT date of the 2015-2016 school year is quickly approaching: June 4. It is recommended that college-bound students take the SAT spring of their junior year or fall of their senior year (or both!). Although some colleges do not require an SAT score for admission, many colleges do. The average scores for students admitted to the University of Maryland are 610-720 on Math and 580-690 on Reading (PowerScore, Inc.). Frederick Community College does not require SAT scores, but a score of at least 500 on either the Math or Reading sections exempt an applicant from that subject's placement test. In order to prepare students for the SAT, BELL tutoring will be holding special SAT prep sessions at the end of May. Free SAT practice can also be found on the websites for the College Board and Khan Academy. Talk to your math or English teacher if you have any questions about BELL tutoring or the SAT, and good luck on June 4!
